In The Interim

"Anything that exists effectively in history must have form," wrote UU theologian James Luther Adams. "And the creation of a form requires power. It requires not only the power of thought but the power of organization and the organization of power." Adams reminded us that the strengths of liberal religion, when effectively arrayed, could bring justice and peace to a troubled world, but only when we are willing to embrace the organization of power and the power of organization.

We joke about being a disorganized rather than an organized religion. We make excuses: we are too small (in spite of the fact that in survey after survey people indicate that they would like to belong to a church just like the UU church, in only they knew that such a place existed!), too poor (in spite of the fact that Unitarian Universalists have among the highest per capita income of any religious group in the United States), and too modest to mold ourselves into a lean, un-mean religious machine.

Adams would have none of that. He urged us to get serious about our faith, to become an effective force for good in our communities. He said, in effect, "Don't be afraid of power. Don't shy away from organization. Don't fall for the nonsense about structure equating with unnecessary bureaucracy. Leverage your strength!"

And that is what I am hoping you will do here at The Unitarian Church in Westport. I'm hoping you will flex your organizational muscles as you grow towards the next chapter in your storied history, that you will embrace and nurture the structures that will best support your ministries, that you will clarify, document, meet, talk, listen, vote, implement.

How can we do that? Glad you asked. Start by attending the workshop on The Power of Organization and the Organization of Power on Saturday September 20th, 2014 @ 1 pm in the East Wing. Join me and members of the Nominating and Leadership Development Committee for this half-day event focusing on leadership in our congregation. Whether you are a committee chair who has been here for decades or a brand new member looking for your particular place in the life of this community, you are welcome and will benefit. The workshop will be a lively and interactive experience that combines practical information with philosophical exploration. Best of all, snacks will be provided. The Unexpected Gifts

hen I first read the invitation to become a Pastoral Care Associate (PCA) in our UU community, I sensed a quiet voice within urging me to raise my hand. Though not understanding all that goes into being a PCA, I believed this would be one way to give back to the UU community as a whole for all the goodness and inspiration I've received over the handful of years I've been a member here. I also had been in search of an opportunity to serve in some way, and this seemed like a good path to take to do just that.

It has been almost a year since I, along with 17 other UU members, started along this path to becoming a PCA. And here's the surprise: The unexpected gift for me is that I am the one receiving so much. Whereas I started out thinking that being a PCA was a great opportunity to give, I now experience this role as a call to "sacred work" and an opportunity filled with wonderful blessings. The blessings have come in a number of ways. One that has meant a lot to me is a deep connection to a loving, compassionate group of UU members who went through the training with me. The PCA Leadership Team comprised of Rev. Roberta Finkelstein, Alex Horsky, Jim Francek, Suzan Converse and Tom Hearne did an excellent job in guiding us toward what it means to be a PCA. We practiced skills in deep listening and came to understand even more what compassionate care and true presence are. We also learned about our own limitations and what a PCA can and cannot do. We built community as we learned together and shared our own lives and concerns with one another.

Then came the greatest gift of all. The time came when, as a PCA, I was asked to serve, to connect with one of our UU church members who had requested a PCA. I so appreciate the opportunity of spending time with this person whom I visit on a monthly basis. While this person appears to enjoy our visits and always greets me with a wonderful smile, I know that I am once again on not only the giving side, but on the receiving side as well. As I listen to her, I can't help but be touched by her courage, her resilience and her spirit. I feel privileged that I am allowed to be present to another person in such a soulful way. And, yes, while there are joys and sorrows spoken out loud, there is also laughter and light-heartedness in this mix. I think one of the most important acts we do in being truly present to one another as a PCA or simply as one human being to another is to listen deeply, from the heart as well as the head. Mark Nepo says it so well when he writes:

"But why listen at all? Because listening stitches the world together. Because listening is the doorway to everything that matters. It enlivens the heart the way breathing enlivens the lungs. We listen to awaken our heart. We do this to stay vital and alive. This is the work of reverence: to stay vital and alive by listening deeply. Ultimately, a devotion to deep listening remains the simple and sacred work of being here."

I'll end by way of saying what I have found--that being a PCA is a blessing and a gift; it is "the simple and sacred work of being here." And I am so grateful to our UU church for this opportunity.

New York: The Power and the People & Intimate Apparel

Once again we're collaborating with the Westport Country Playhouse and TEAM Westport, this time bringing together Ric Burn's documentary film New York: The Power and the People and the Playhouse's production of the Pulitzer Prize winning play, "Intimate Apparel".

The film sets the historical backdrop — New York City around the turn of the 20th century, immigration, labor unrest, the garment industry, the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire, the Flatiron Building went up, and the subway went down. It's a fascinating look at the city during the years when "Intimate Apparel" takes place. "Intimate Apparel"- the time is 1905, the place

New York City, where Esther, a black seamstress, lives in a boarding house for women and sews intimate apparel for clients who range from wealthy white patrons to prostitutes. The play offers poignant commentary on an era when the cut and color of one's dress—and of course, skin—determined whom one could and could not marry, sleep with, even talk to in public.

Chad Kinsman, Artistic and Management Coordinator for the Playhouse, will lead a post-film discussion and we will be organizing a group to see the play together in October.

FROM THE BOARD

Promises

Who am I so speak on this subject? I could dwell the night on the broken ones. I think of one of my favorite modern day poets, Jackson Browne in "These Days":

These days I sit on corner stones And count the time in quarter tones to ten, my friend Don't confront me with my failures I had not forgotten them

I have not forgotten them. But I do want my promises to mean something and I think I've improved and will continue to try. I think I'm a UU because I want truth and honesty – I want to do what I've said I'll do.

Promise: noun - a declaration that something will or will not be done

This subject came up at the last Board Meeting. As do most non-profit's we assume that we'll collect almost all of pledged funds, allowing for some folks who may have had a change in financial circumstances – the practical part of relying on our membership's generosity to pay our bills. This year's fulfillment is considerably less than normal. Some may be feeling like "wait and see" where TUCW goes next, who leads? Others may simply be unaware they have overlooked this...

Pledge: noun - a solemn promise or agreement to do or refrain from doing something

I may have over-pledged this coming year. Starting with an inspirational meeting at Catherine Onyemenlukwe's house and the hosannas;) I went up 10% (you must see the video Julia Wyatt and John Simboli made about our amazing congregation (add link and put on website)) then the Board dug deeper to set an example, followed by UGNO arm-twisting with beer. I'll figure it out somehow. I've also been dropping checks with "pledge" in the memo the last few weeks as I saw I was at 95% ish of last years pledge and needed them to count.

The Transition Team met in August to plan the work we will undertake in the second year of our transition with Rev. Roberta. Our three main jobs in the coming months will be:

- organizing and running our second annual UUA Book Fair;
- working with church committees to help them write Committee Charters; and
- working with the congregation to develop our own Congregational Covenant.

Why these tasks?

1. The book fair was a good fund raiser for our church last year, and people told us that they appreciated the opportunity to browse, and to buy some great books. We also think the book fair is a great way of continuing to strengthen our connections with the UUA. The book fair will take place the first two Sundays in November in the East Wing. This year we hope to offer books that have been personally recommended by our staff and members. 2. Our website currently shows more than 40 church committees. What are their goals? Who fills roles within each committee? What are the committees' responsibilities? Transition team members will work with committee members to answer these questions and more, resulting in a simple but effective Committee Charter for each church committee. It will be like a job description for each committee! This work should be completed by December.

3. Finally, in the early part of 2015 we will be asking each of you to tell us what you think should be included in our congregational covenant. There won't be meetings to attend to be part of this, we will simply ask you to consider a couple of questions about what you need from others in the congregation, and what you are willing to offer. The resulting document will be a written promise to each other, stating how we will be together as a congregation. Many of us are familiar with making covenants within church groups, teams, or committees. This will be a covenant for the whole congregation, which we will be able to share with new members. More information on this subject will follow.
